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Musings from your visiting Priest

This is my first time writing for the Witness since I arrived in SLO almost six weeks ago. Let me say right up front that your welcome to me has been nothing less than overwhelming. I have been working part time for a number of years since my official "retirement." (Old priests don't really retire. We just go silent one day!) For almost six years I worked at St. Jude's Church in Cupertino as their priest assistant, and filling in after their Rector left until COVID broke out. It was difficult to leave that wonderful community where I had become very attached and at home. Throughout the pandemic we all suffered from our loss of community and human engagement and I believe that I'm still "recovering" from that experience (Thankfully, I never caught COVID). Coming to St. Stephens for this sabbatical replacement has been my first opportunity to be a part of a real ongoing and sustained community and I have realized just how much I've missed it. I can only express to you all how grateful I am for the warm and rich welcome you all have offered me. I am really enjoying getting to know at least some of you and I hope I will be able to meet more of you as the summer moves on. Please know that I would love to have time to sit with some tea or coffee in your homes and learn about your lives and work. Give me a call or call the parish office to make that happen.

Having said all that, it's very exciting to find you all to be a congregation of very inquisitive and open people. As some of you may have seen from my biography, I am a priest with two very important vocations. Education and parish ministry have always been two totally intertwined passions for me. I was having a conversation this morning at church where I was invited to think about my own vocation and became aware that I have always been an inquiring spirit, unwilling to accept the conventional wisdom of the tradition. The class that I'm teaching on Tuesday evenings is grounded in an historically critical mode of study that invites us to think about the world in which Jesus and his contemporaries lived and thought. This, for some might be a revolutionary or even a dangerous adventure. My experience with this project has shown me that there is an entirely different invitation being offered us in our contemporary world to reconsider and perhaps reconfigure much of what our traditions have taught us. This, of course can and should be frightening and perhaps threatening. I acknowledge and appreciate that.

Nevertheless, I am convinced that our tradition has great power and possibility for human and creational transformation. Our world is at a very crucial tipping point in which the choices we make and the decisions we pursue will determine the survival and the flourishing of our created world. Our role as Christian

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people is to devote our lives to the ultimate sustainability and flourishing of our world. Our traditional ways of thinking about "salvation" (which means "wholeness") is something "out of this world." I believe that is wrong thinking and that we must find ways to contribute to the healing (mending) of this world as the place that the Divine loves and is committed to, including us, God's creatures and stewards.

I believe that we are at a critical juncture of human existence and that we must make critical and existential decisions about our own future and the future of our children and their children after them. This is a time for the Jesus movement to reassert itself in our world and reclaim the role of prophetic compassion and transformative action on behalf of all creation. Our divine source has given us all that we need to turn our destructive and death-dealing world around. We are called, I believe to take up the challenge and set out with courage and strength to begin to challenge our world so dedicated to its own demise. The movement of Jesus is not simply a movement of love but a movement of human transformation. Our churches are not used to hearing this call to transformation and renewal. I believe that we need to awaken and follow in the path that we have been called to follow.

The class that I have offered is an invitation to begin to rethink and regain our attention to the core of what Jesus called "the good news." The essential core of that good news is that the Divine wills for this creation to both thrive and blossom and that we are an essential element in that project's success. That is what the Jesus movement is all about. That is what I am committed to proclaiming and teaching. If we have found ourselves in this place at this time, perhaps it was meant to be. I invite you to engage with me in this conversation this summer while I am with you. I invite you to reconsider what this thing called "Christianity" might mean for you and your children as we face a world filled with despair, doubt, and violence. Let's have some "no holds barred" conversations about what this might mean for us here in this place. That's my challenge for us this lazy summer while I'm here. I'll look forward to sharing with you.

Sexton and Junior Warden Update

Sexton Lee Hollister and Junior Warden Shannon Larrabee have been working behind the scenes to get several projects completed around the parish. They are happy to announce that St. Stephen's will begin working with Dan's Landscape of San Luis Obispo to take over the maintenance of the grounds around the property starting June 16. Shannon and Lee reviewed several proposals for a new landscape maintenance company and were impressed with Dan's Landscapes good communication, professionalism, and vision of the property. The goal is to continue to provide a beautiful landscape that is drought tolerant, low water usage, cohesive and works towards lower maintenance. The Memorial Garden will be maintained and elevated along with an extensive cleanup and replanting project taking place over the next few weeks.

With the help of Vestry member Jamie Hess, Lee and Shannon are working towards developing a comprehensive short and long-term maintenance plan for the parish and grounds. An inventory was completed, and a binder and spreadsheet will be developed to allow for planning and budgeting for routine maintenance and larger projects such as painting, roof maintenance and other items.

Thank you to everyone who has worked with us to address the parking lot replacement project. We have received three bids, asked for revisions, and will have more details to present to everyone soon. After several revisions, we believe that we will have a contractor selected that will be able to install a functional parking lot with a budget that will require a combination of contributions from the Endowment Fund and fundraising at an achievable level from Parish membership. The scope of the project we are now considering should provide minimal disruption (7-10 days) and provide us with a solid parking lot that will serve us well for years to come.

Our goal is to have the following projects completed by this Fall: parking lot replaced, landscape spruced up, replanted and looking good, new carpet for the Church, entrance doors with new stain, wood parquet floors repaired and a comprehensive plan with binder for regular maintenance items along short and long term maintenance projects.

Treasurer's Report

As you may know, churches typically begin each year with a negative budget. Experience had shown that collection results typically exceed the budget. We at St. Stephen's have done this for many years.

For calendar year 2023, our budget envisioned an operating loss of -\$36,255.00 compared to last year's budget of -\$26,241.02. In the event of a shortfall in a calendar year, we can draw upon the cash in the Operating account at Mechanics Bank which, on May 31, 2023, had a balance of \$47,051.29. We also have an investment account with State Street for our endowment which amounted to \$654,439.05 on May 31, 2023. Endowment funds are restricted for specific uses and are not available to use for operating expenses. Thus our only cushion in the event of an operating loss for a year is the account at Mechanics Bank.

Hopefully, we will be able to maintain a favorable budget variance for the rest of the year. We are particularly hopeful the Givers of Record donations will increase to the level budgeted.

Worshiping Around the World

It has been guite an experience to worship in a different country on each of the past five Sundays!

- 1. St. Peter's Episcopal Church in Santa Maria, CA (Diocese of Los Angeles). A small and welcoming community just down the road from SLO. I know the priest, The Rev. Peter Kang, but he was on vacation. All very familiar.
- 2. St. John's Waterloo in London (Diocese of Southwark, Church of England). My flight arrived at 6.30am and check-in was not until 2pm. The other churches in the area of my hotel were either at 11am (later than I preferred) or did not accept the ministry of women. So,
 - even though St. John's Waterloo was a little bit further afield, and was observing Morning Prayer for the early service, it suited my needs well. I stayed for coffee hour and had a lovely chat with an intergenerational group at my table. It was Pentecost Sunday, and the Curate preached on the Coming of the Holy Spirit as an act of full inclusion in the Church. I had never heard that perspective before, and she wasn't wrong!
- 3. Holy Convent of St. George in Marathon, Greece (Greek Orthodox). Fr. Nektarios Mamalougos was my contact for my project. On Saturday, June 3, we showed up early at the Convent for Mattins and the Divine Service. It lasted THREE HOURS! Lots of chanting by the nuns and Fr. Nektarios. The interior of the building



- was covered with murals of Jesus and the Saints. They were commemorating the Saturday of Souls, very much like our All Souls' Day, commemorating the dead, from Adam & Eve to the present day. Congregants submit names right up to the last minute, and the priest chants each name. There were probably 15 in attendance, and hundreds of names were chanted in quick succession. Very powerful and prayerful!
- 4. St. George's Cathedral in Cape Town, South Africa (Diocese of Cape Town, Anglican Church of Southern Africa). Wonderful high-church liturgy, complete with full procession, incense, censing the altar during the procession and at the Offertory, censing the people and the clergy, and chanting of the Sursum Corda or Dialogue. The sermon was steeped in prayer for faith and hope for a future of social and racial equity and equality. The work of Archbishop Tutu, FW DeKlerk and Nelson Mandela is both, still alive, and nowhere near finished ... in South Africa and around the globe!
- 5. Green Park Free Church, New Delhi, India (Diocese of Delhi, Church of North India, part of the Anglican Communion). A very familiar service, in English. The service in Hindi was earlier in the morning. It was interesting to see a number of congregants who appeared between the ages of 25-50yo. Like Cape Town Cathedral, the congregation was not an ex-pat congregation, yet both sang traditional Western Victorian hymns! And both Delhi and Cape Town offered different forms of intinction when receiving the sacramental wine...neither of which will be employed at St. Stephen's! The best part of the service was the removal of shoes as we approached the altar to receive the Sacrament. I have preached on this before, and the relevant text is coming up shortly after my return to St. Stephen's!

Hopefully I will be able to attend a Sunday Service in each of the three remaining cities, Bangkok, Sydney and Auckland (I am not in Manila on a Sunday). Sydney will be tough, as, like London, I arrive early in the morning. It will depend on my hosts. The Anglican Communion is common in its worship and diverse in its expressions! And we all come together as expressed by Ephesians 4:1-6!
