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Faith & Justice: An Ash Wednesday Sermon

Sin comes up a lot during Lent. So, what is sin, and am I doing it right?

Sin is the seeking of our own will instead of the will of God, thus distorting our relationship with God, with other people,

and with all creation. (BCP p848)

Anglicans are intentionally vaguely specific and specifically vague, so interpretations of that definition of sin most likely cover a wide spectrum. But clearly the definition

understands sin as being much more than breaking the 10 Commandments (look them up as a refresher in BCP p350).

What we discover later in the Bible after the 10 Commandments, particularly in the writings of the Prophets, are more concerns that distort our relationship with God and God's people. In Ash Wednesday's passage from Isaiah 58:1-12, economic disparity and a disregard for social justice are specifically pointed out as sins.

Why do we fast, but <u>you do not see</u>? Why humble ourselves, but <u>you do not notice</u>? Look, you serve your own interest on your fast-day, <u>and oppress all your workers</u>.

This warning against piety without social justice is a theme for Isaiah, Amos, and other prophets, and it is a theme for Jesus, as He states in the Ash Wednesday Gospel, Matthew 6:1-6,16-21:

Beware of practicing your piety before others in order to be seen by them.

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We joke that this is the Gospel set for Ash Wednesday, the day we visibly mark our piety and then go out into the wider world to show that we've done our duty. The important part of the sentence, though, is "in order to" – or "that your purpose be". Don't be pious "in order to" be seen. Be as pious as you want, publicly or privately, but make sure that your piety is accompanied by humility and justice, not by vanity.

Jesus goes on to elaborate what a pious and righteous person should do: almsgiving, prayer and fasting. The first action Jesus mentions is *ALMSGIVING!* Then prayer, then fasting.

I don't know how many of you know this, but the Bible is chock-full of social justice...like...the social justice issues that we're concerned about today: Economic disparity, concern for widows, orphans and foreigners & refugees, the environment, the rich getting richer and the poor getting poorer...the list goes on. Social justice is part of having a right relationship with God. So, our prayer and fasting should support our almsgiving (our social justice).

Lent is a journey, a journey toward being reconciled to God. Really, one's whole life is a journey toward God in the hope of one day fully realizing God's love. That journey may look like almsgiving, prayer and fasting. But your almsgiving, prayer and fasting may also look like making a substantial difference in the lives of those who struggle with economic injustice, climate injustice, legal injustice, racial injustice and injustices of all kids.

This Lent, drink wine, eat steak and enjoy chocolate. I don't care, and I don't think God does, either. More importantly, serve the poor, restore the earth, heal the sick, and help the oppressed go free. Love God, love your neighbor, love your enemy.

This, Lent, I entreat you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God (2 Cor 5.20).










Wanted: Feet and Voices



From the Vestry

The Vestry meets on the 3rd Sunday of the Month (usually) to discuss the business affairs of the parish. Here are some highlights of the meeting on February 18, 2024:

After years of abeyance, the Vestry will be returning to having assigned ministries. Each Vestry member will be responsible for ensuring that a ministry of the parish is functioning and resourced. They may or may not be the Head of Ministry, but will certainly be the Vestry liaison. Assignments will be made at the Vestry Retreat on March 2.

The annual Parochial Report was approved. Data on membership, attendance and finances are reported to the national Church and the Diocese, due March 1.

The drawdown and use of Endowment Available to Spend 2024 has been delayed until needed. As a short-term measure to ensure that the deficit budget does not impact cash flow, it was agreed upon passage of the 2024 Budget at the Annual Meeting that the Available to Spend would cover the shortfall. At the moment, the cash flow is fine, so the Vestry came to the consensus that, with ongoing review and consultation with Treasurer, cash flow will be reviewed regularly, and the draw down would take place only if necessary.

The next meeting is March 17, 2024, and then the meetings will revert to the 2nd Sunday of the month. If you have an issue that you think should be addressed by the Vestry, please submit your request no less than 2 weeks before the next Vestry Meeting to the Rector or Wardens. All Vestry Meetings are open to members of the parish. Requests to speak can be made, approved on an individual basis. Executive Sessions are closed to Vestry members only, including the Clerk, Treasurer and Rector.
