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What are you grateful for?

A priest was sharing how his 9 year old daughter, when sharing about her day at the dinner table, would mostly complain. He wanted to turn this around, knowing that his daughter's life was not a miserable one by any stretch of her young imagination. So,

he started a new dinner table exercise for the family: What are 3 things that happened today that you are grateful for? It has revolutionized dinner and the personal outlooks of daughter, father and mother.

What happened in your life today that you are grateful for? How did you respond? How did it make you feel? Do you need to be more aware of things for which to be grateful?

To be grateful is to be "appreciative of benefits received" (Merriam-Webster.com). It is closely related to being thankful. At the Eucharist, we give thanks for all the Jesus has done for us in His Incarnation, earthly ministry, Death, Resurrection and Ascension.



Fr Ian is grateful for this beautiful place where he is privileged to live and serve.

The word "Eucharist" means "Thanksgiving". In the BCP and in our service booklets, the heading above the Eucharistic Prayer is "The Great Thanksgiving" because that's what we're doing:

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. It is right to give God thanks and praise.

And then we go on to list the divine activities for which we are giving thanks.

You bring your whole self to Sunday worship, and our liturgy reflects that:

- Your need to understand your relationship with God, with others and with the world around you: the Liturgy of the Word, and particularly the scriptures, including the Psalm.
- Your griefs, sorrows, difficulties and anxieties: the Prayers of the People.
- Your mistakes, shortcomings, and "we have left undone those things which we ought to have done; and we have done those things which we ought not to have done": the Confession.
- Your joy, blessings, happiness: the Gloria

Your gratefulness – not only for the Divine activities, but for the seemingly mundane activities in your daily life for which you are grateful – should be brought into your worship, as well. And I hope that you bring those with you into worship.

The Altar Party and Choir are going to be more intentional about bringing that for which we are grateful into our worship.

The time before the service – the last 10 minutes or so – tend to be filled with the chitchat of everyday life. Long gone are the days when everyone entered the church and remained silent until worship started (someone from another parish at Spring Renewal was lamenting this to me). My desire is to get those of us who lead worship (including the Rector and any visiting clergy) to spend the last 5 minutes before worship starts in preparation for worship rather than in idle chitchat (sometimes not so idle!).

So, I've started asking the Altar Party and Choir: What from this past week are you grateful for? As you prepare for worship, hold that in your heart and take it into your worship. This is not just to stop the chitchat before the service; this is to discover if this little change has bigger consequences. As we gather around the Holy Table, will it revolutionize our individual time in worship and our personal outlooks?

What happened in your life today that you are grateful for? Ask yourself that question every day, and see what happens!

Drink This Cup



In the Eucharistic Prayer, Jesus' words are repeated: "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new covenant." We've returned to the Common Cup to the spiritual joy of many. Those who do not receive the wine can rest assured that if you have received the bread without the wine, you have received full Communion. But some may need more: to receive the Cup but not the wine. The LEMs offer the chalice to every person with the words: "The Blood of Christ, the cup of salvation." For those who do not drink from the cup, you can engage with the chalice of wine in a way that is honoring, respectful, and leaves one feeling the sweetness of the moment. The "halfway" option of intinction or dipping the wafer into the wine is not an option due to it being far more unhygienic than sharing the chalice. And intinction is also not allowed by our Bishop. In February, Br Dennis wrote about he kisses the cup at the words "The Blood of Christ, the cup of salvation." Some people cross their arms over their chest and receive blessing. Others reverently touch the chalice without drinking. Some simply turn and walk away. The important thing is that all of these practices, when offered with reverent intention, are fine. The receiving of Holy Communion is a deeply personal and intimate moment with Jesus. If it feels right to you, it is surely right with God.

Episcopal Church 101 / Faith Formation / Confirmation

A faith formation course will take place in June and July. There are a couple of options that follow on from one another. The dates below are all Tuesdays starting at 5.30pm

For those who have been Confirmed in another denomination OR you're just interested in learning more about The Episcopal Church:

- June 4 Episcopal Church 101 a history, who we are, what we believe, how we do things. This will be an extended version of previous versions.
- If you have been Confirmed by a Bishop in another denomination (Orthodox, RC, ELCA Lutheran or Methodist), and you wish to be Received into The Episcopal Church, that will happen on St Stephen's Day, September 8, 2024. If you do not wish to be Received, you are still a part of the St Stephen's Family!

For those who want to know more about the Christian faith and the Episcopalian expression of it:

- June 4 through July 23 (minus July 3) Episcopal Church 101 and then a 6-session course including:
 - ♦ The Church
 - ♦ Living as a Christian
 - ♦ Prayer & Worship
 - ♦ The Sacraments
 - ♦ The Eucharist
 - ♦ Baptism
 - **♦** Confirmation
 - ♦ Jesus: Life and Ministry
 - ♦ Jesus: Death and Resurrection
 - ♦ Homework presentations

If you decide to be Received from another denomination (see above) or Confirmed if you have not been Confirmed by a Bishop in another denomination, you can opt to be Received or Confirmed upon completion of the full 6-session course. That will happen on St Stephen's Day, September 8, 2024. If you do not wish to be Confirmed or Received, you are still a part of the St Stephen's Family! You do not need to make any decision prior to attending the course. And if your desire is simply to learn more, you are most welcome.



From the Vestry

The Vestry meets on the 2nd Sunday of the Month to discuss the business affairs of the parish. Here are some highlights of the meeting on May 12, 2024:

- The Treasurer engaged the Vestry in a conversation about online giving platforms. Currently, PayPal and ACH bank transfer are the only online giving options. PayPal's fees are a bit expensive, and ACH is not nimble. After reviewing several platforms, the Treasurer recommends that St Stephen's use Tithe.ly, designed specifically for churches. The Vestry will be trying it out between meetings.
- The June Vestry meeting will be an informational meeting with SmartShare Housing. We will continue
 our exploration about conducting a pilot program to rent the slab to a tiny home owner. If you are
 interested in learning more, join the conversation.
- Georgia Maggelet, who, with her mother Sarah, has volunteered for VBS and is a some-time attender
 at Sunday Services with her grandmother Gail Taylor, requested a grant to support her trip to the UCC
 Western Regional Youth Event (WRYE). Youth (current 6th graders to current 12th graders) from
 churches in western half of the United States come together for music, inspirational speakers, direct
 service opportunities, workshops, games, fun, and this time we're also doing a day at Disneyland! The
 Vestry approved a full scholarship to be taken from funds in the Operating Account that are
 designated for youth ministry.

The next meeting is June 9, 2024. It will be a conversation about partnering with SmartShare Housing (see above). If you have an issue that you think should be addressed by the Vestry, please submit your request no less than 2 weeks before the next Vestry Meeting to the Rector or Wardens. All Vestry Meetings are open to members of the parish. Requests to speak can be made, approved on an individual basis. Executive Sessions are closed to Vestry members only, including the Clerk, Treasurer and Rector.

Our Centering Prayer deepens further when we let go with our whole being: mind, emotions, and body, as Thomas Keating urges us. In this retreat we will explore Centering Prayer as a practice, in a way suitable for those new to it, as well as for those who have been practicing for a long time. Along with this we will explore three-centered knowing, not just with our heads but with our entire physical, emotional and intellectual being. In The Wisdom Jesus, Cynthia Bourgeault talks about tuning into Jesus as a living being here with us now she says, "It's not knowing something more, like a new fact or piece of esoteric information; it's knowing deeper, knowing with more and more of your being engaged."





We have a beautiful, historic church that is an essential part of our heritage and our identity in San Luis Obispo. Leading the care of this treasure is our Sexton,

When there's a need for repair, a malfunction of equipment, or someone who knows how to use the business end of an electric drill, Lee is usually the first one called. He also has a major role in planning and executing major projects, such as the recent re-

surfacing of the parking lot and the replacing of carpeting in the church.


Several parishioners assisted in moving the pews when our new carpet was installed in the church, among them Rick Brady, Spud Schroeder, Skip Parks, Beau Parks and Gus Gibson.

Additional volunteers, Spud Schroeder and Ethan Stan, assist in putting out and retrieving our garbage cans weekly. Kathanne Lynch has organized volunteers to do litter pick-up in the church neighborhood in the fall. Her helpers have included Kay and Clark Lewis, Amy Lewis, Diane Levison, Elizabeth Potter, Cheryl and Craig McCollum and Kathryn Bumpass, among others.

Our costs for Buildings and Grounds are about 8% of our overall annual budget. These include expenses for janitorial services, garbage; electricity, gas; water, landscaping and routine maintenance.

Our monthly expenses include janitorial services, provided by Executive Janitorial.

Solar panels on the education wing of our buildings hold down our costs for electricity, and also contribute to our stewardship of Creation.



Recently installed dry-scaping of the Grounds likewise boosts our care for Creation, and saves us a lot of money on water bills. Dan's Landscaping is responsible for maintenance of the Grounds.

Total charges for water, not just landscaping, have fallen significantly since the new landscaping was installed.

Routine maintenance of our historic building is ongoing.

The 2023 campaign, "Re-Fresh St. Stephen's" addressed large projects for much-needed maintenance. The parking lot was resurfaced, a crack in the church floor was fixed and new carpeting installed.

The Vestry set \$40,000 as our goal for the Re-Fresh campaign, but thanks to the generosity of our parish, we exceeded our goal, allowing for the completion of other much-needed maintenance.
