## Our Eucharistic Brunch

Our Gospel for the 2nd Sunday of Easter in all 3 lectionary years is the one of

Doubting Thomas. The full list of readings for Year B are Acts 4:32-35/1 John 1:1-2:2 / Psalm 133 / John 20:19-31. The story of Doubting Thomas is a favorite of mine because it reassures me that I am still accepted by Jesus even if I have doubts. Even though I don't have a Doubting Thomas moment, that doesn't mean I don't fail to live up to

my Baptismal Covenant! And the Doubting Thomas story reminds me that wherever I am on my spiritual journey, Jesus welcomes me.

At the Eucharistic Brunch on April 7, Holy Communion was celebrated in the context of a meal. The bread was broken at the beginning of the meal, as Jesus did at the Last Supper, a long Jewish tradition; the wine was taken at the end of the meal, as it is described in the Gospels and in our Eucharistic Prayers. In between, we had brunch and conversation. Our first conversation was directly related to the Gospel reading of the day:

With whom do you identify in today's Gospel? Jesus when He appears? Jesus when He gives the Spirit? Jesus when He forgives? Jesus when He meets Thomas? A disciple in fear? One who receives the Spirit? One who receives forgiveness? One who retains sins? Thomas before he met Jesus? Thomas when he met Jesus? One who through believing may have life in His name?

After that robust conversation, it was time to move the conversation further:

Now that you have shared some of your story through the first conversation question, how can you share your story with other people in your life?

We each are on a spiritual journey, and our journeys intersect here at St. Stephen's. In relation to today's Gospel, that means when you have doubts about faith, Jesus does not reject you. Wherever you are on your spiritual journey, Jesus welcomes you. It also means that you, too, can share your spiritual journey with others.

Whether you were part of the Eucharistic Brunch conversations or were elsewhere that day, reflect and pray on these questions and where your answers might direct the next steps on your spiritual journey. As we move through the Season of Easter, we will hear stories about how Jesus' Resurrection empowered the Disciples to do what Jesus was training them to do in the first place: To proclaim the Good News to others. While you reflect and pray on these conversations we have had today, think about how you can be a Disciple, and how you can show others the signs of Jesus so that they may come to believe that Jesus is the Messiah. (*ref John 30,31*).



## From the Vestry

The Vestry meets on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Sunday of the Month to discuss the business affairs of the parish. Here are some highlights of the meeting on April 14, 2024, the first of alternating meetings that will focus on conversations about big topics rather than on action items:

- \* The Vestry has approved the transfer of \$50,000 of unused funds from the "Re-Fresh St. Stephen's Campaign" to the Endowment for forthcoming Building & Grounds requirements, aligning with the Campaign's strategy. Around \$14,000 still resides in the Operating account, earmarked for potential Buildings & Grounds projects in the immediate future. The Vestry expresses profound gratitude to all who generously contributed to this highly effective fundraising endeavor, enhancing our campus environment.
- \* The Vestry's first conversation focused on what questions need to be addressed in order to consider an exploration of a pilot project with SmartShare Housing for renting the slab to house a tiny home.
- \* The Vestry's second conversation looked at what is needed in order to support the next steps of the Stewardship Team and Mission Team.

The next meeting is May 12, 2024. If you have an issue that you think should be addressed by the Vestry, please submit your request no less than 2 weeks before the next Vestry Meeting to the Rector or Wardens. All Vestry Meetings are open to members of the parish. Requests to speak can be made, approved on an individual basis. Executive Sessions are closed to Vestry members only, including the Clerk, Treasurer and Rector.



If you would like to dedicate flowers or candles in thanksgiving, in celebration or in memory of your loved ones let us know.




