It will always be Christmas!

There are many people around us who believe that Christmas should no longer be a Christian or religious holiday because more people celebrate it as a secular

holiday. Let them have their Winter Festival. That's fine. For us, Christ was never taking out of Christmas, because by the very nature of the word, Christmas is about Christ. The time of year for the Birth of Christ and the decorative customs around it are immaterial to the word "Christmas" and its meaning. We could move the date and get rid of the decorated trees, but we would still call it Christmas...even call it XMAS! To that end, I will share my sermon from Christmas 2023.

> The War on Christmas starts earlier every year. It begins with one little word: XMAS! XMAS is short and easy to write. *"Keep the Christ in Christmas!"* they shout! A *"blasphemous omission of the name of Christ"* decries one far-right



demagogue. (Gerald LK Smith) "A war against the name of Jesus Christ" says one dynastic evangelist. (Franklin Graham) But what of history? Have they seen the Greek Letters Chi-Rho? What look like X and P to you and me. But to ancient Greeks they are C & R. They begin the name of Christ! They become Christus Rex, Christ the King! C & R / X & P – seen by Emperor Constantine at the Milvian Bridge. The name of Christ painted on his soldiers' shields. A promise of victory, and the world's most consequential conversion. An Emperor discovered Christ in the letters X & P. History shows X for Christ in 1100. X'temmas for Christmas in 1551 England. Has the war on Christmas been raging all this time? But what of history and facts? Who has need of them? But

then a glimmer of hope for facts and science. It's 1957 and conservative News and Views attacks XMAS as "X=The Unknown Quantity". Yes! Yes! In math and science, X is the unknown quantity. The new X – we all know what it was formally known as – a way to get the Good News of X to millions in 280 characters. X for multiplication ... multiplying Jesus' Love to infinity and beyond! Put an X in the box to show you agree: Yes! Affirm! I'm in! Amen! X a Simple letter. A simple word. The Word Made Flesh. XMAS cannot be the war on Christmas. The greatness of Christ is crammed into one small letter! The greatness of the Messiah is crammed into one small child! XMAS is not the war on Christmas. The Parish Annual Meeting: January 26, 2024 after the 10am Service

We will elect 3 Vestry members for 3-year terms and 1 Vestry member for a 2-year term since we did not fill the seats at the last Annual Meeting. We will give our thanks to Jim Gates, Shannon Larrabee and Elizabeth Potter for their 3-year term of service. And we will elect Delegates to Diocesan Convention. If you would like to enquire about nominations, please see one of the 3 mentioned above who form the Nominations Committee.

In order to allow more time for dialog about the work and ministries of the parish.

The Annual Report will be available to members of the congregation no later than January 19. To request it in electronic form, please contact Fr lan the week prior. Voter and candidate eligibility includes having pledged or been a giver of record in 2024 and 2025 and a communicant in good standing. The term for a Vestry member is 3 years (with one 2yr term); for Delegates is one year with the commitment to attend 4 meetings during the year and Diocesan Convention via Zoom on Saturday, November 1, 2025.

From the Vestry

The Vestry meets on the 2nd Sunday of the Month to discuss the business affairs of the parish. We had a conversation meeting on November 10. Here are some highlights:

- * The Treasurer relayed positive news about Annual Giving Campaign. The target for pledges was exceeded, which puts us in a good position to fund all of our ministries and possibly have a surplus that will refill the coffers.
- * The Vestry reviewed the Ingathering Coffee Hour conversation and is processing the feedback for further reporting back and next steps.
- * Fr Ian provided an update on our space use and relationships with Grass Roots II and CAPSLO. It has been a bumpy year with Grass Roots, but with new suggestions and connections, there are hopes that operations will smooth out over the course of 2025. The user agreement with CAPSLO is still being reviewed, and their presence may help with the operations of Grass Roots.

The next meeting is December 8, 2024. If you have an issue that you think should be addressed by the Vestry, please submit your request no less than 2 weeks before the next Vestry Meeting to the Rector or Wardens. All Vestry Meetings are open to members of the parish. Requests to speak can be made, approved on an individual basis. Executive Sessions are closed to Vestry members only, including the Clerk, Treasurer and Rector.

Treasurer's Corner Financial Outlook for 2025

As a professional skeptic, I nevertheless must admit our outlook for this year is outstanding and our outlook for 2025 is better than all anticipations.

This year we had major events which greatly impacted our financial status.

The ReFresh St. Stephens Campaign exceeded all expectations and funded several needed projects (like new carpeting in the sanctuary) as well as established funds for the next several years of capital improvements. The generosity of one parishioner in creating the Matching Donation Campaign of a \$20,000 challenge resulted in parishioners donating \$25,000 over their current pledges resulted in injecting \$45,000 into our Operating Account. Most importantly, this reversed the downward trend of deficit operating results of several years which drained our available funds.

Enough of the great results of 2024. How does 2025 look for St Stephens in its financial perspective? Are we going to have another year of financial struggle and be forced to rely on the results of 2024 to carry us over a budget shortfall? The answer is a resounding **NO!** The outlook for 2025 shows we are going to have a great year financially which will benefit all our ministries and programs to a degree more than anticipated.

We established an Aspirational Budget for 2025 based on Aspirational Pledging of \$191,450. Historically, when we finalized the budget for the next year we have had to cut ministries and programs as pledge campaign results fell short of the Aspirational Pledging.

To date, we have received a total pledges of 204,090.00 which exceeds our Aspirational Pledging goal of \$191,450 by \$12,640. This is outstanding. However, as of today we have not received pledges from seven parishioners who last year pledged and donated a total of \$23,930. Thus we are looking at potentially receiving that much more in pledging for 2025 – assuming those parishioners give the same amount as in 2024. This creates a likely result of receiving a total pledging of \$228,020 which is \$36,570 more than our Aspirational Pledging target. We must finalize the 2025 pledging before November 30 so we can create our budget for 2025.

Let us look a bit deeper into the pledge results thus far:

- We lost 3 parishioners who pledged a total of \$9,100 in 2024.
- Of the parishioners who have pledged thus far, their total pledges increased by \$22,272 over their 2024 pledges.
- New parishioners pledged \$39,650.
- However, \$30,000 of the \$39,650 came from one parishioner.
- With the pledging improvement, we will look at expanding the scope of selected ministries and programs.
- We recognize we must create a balanced budget but more than that, we also must budget to add a substantial amount to our Operating funds to provide a cushion for the future.
- The Finance Committee will meet the first week in December to recommend a final budget for Vestry approval.

From my January 2024 article: Epiphany is the time we honor the manifestation to the world of the Christ Child as the long-awaited savior. That is accomplished through the story of the wise men from the East visiting the Holy Family, and they brought gold (for Jesus as king), frankincense (for Jesus as Divine) and myrrh (for Jesus' eventual suffering and death).

Fast-forward to the inter-war period, and another visitor offered a gift: Me and my drum. The Little Drummer Boy was written in 1941 and popularized in a 1958 recording by the Harry Simeone Chorale. Leaving A Lasting Legacy For Our Church Family

Here are some ways that gifting can contribute to the work of St. Stephen's. Including St. Stephen's in your will or living trust will help perpetuate the Love of God that St. Stephen's shares with all of San Luis Obispo. Each of the options below can be designated to St. Stephen's in general, or to a specific fund or ministry of St. Stephen's. For those interested, it would be important to consult a financial advisor.

Naming St. Stephen's in your Will or Estate Plan – The "Simple" Plan: Leaving St. Stephen's in your will or estate plan is the simplest way to leave your legacy. After caring for your family, you can name a percentage of your estate or a set amount of your assets.

Charitable Gift Annuity – Ensuring your own financial stability for life: A Charitable Gift Annuity pays you a guaranteed, fixed dollar amount each year for the rest of your life at a rate based on your age. Cash or appreciated securities serve as the capital. Upon your death, the remainder of the gift annuity transfers to the fund(s) at St. Stephen's which you have designated. You will receive an immediate, partial income tax deduction. The minimum of \$10,000 establishes a Charitable Gift Annuity.

Charitable Remainder Trust – The "Meal" is Yours; The "Leftovers" go to St. Stephen's: With a Charitable Remainder Trust, you also receive lifetime income from your gift. Upon your death, the remainder goes to St. Stephen's. Though more complex than the CGA, it can help minimize many potential appreciated asset issues. The minimum of \$100,000 establishes a Charitable Remainder Trust.

Retained Life Estate –The Big Gift: One or more of the assets which you own at the time of your death (home, farm or land) can be bequeathed to St. Stephen's, while retaining control of the asset(s) while you are living. Upon your death, the property transfers to St. Stephen's. At the time of the gift, you receive an immediate, partial income tax deduction for this future gift.

Required Minimum Distribution: For those seniors age 70½, you can give any amount up to \$100,000 from your IRA directly to St. Stephen's. The gift is made directly from an IRA account without counting toward income. You will not pay income taxes on the transfer. Your IRA administrator must remove the funds from your account by December 31 for your donation to qualify for that tax year. Discuss the options further with The Rector.

Appreciated Securities

By donating appreciated securities that you have owned for longer than one year, you receive the same income tax savings as you would by making a gift of cash. You also eliminate paying any tax on the appreciation.
