The Absent Wilderness of Lent

Two days after the big storm in mid-February, I made my weekly Saturday pilgrimage to Avila Beach where I often finish my sermons. It was a bright and sunny morning, but unusually deserted. The beach was strewn with large pieces of driftwood, and there were channels in the sand that, if you weren't paying attention while strolling, were deep enough to cause one to fall and probably injure themselves. I strolled the length of the beach while I read my sermon aloud, muted to any passerby by the larger-than-usual crashing waves. It was beautiful, as usual!

Reflecting on that stroll as Lent approaches made me realize that it's hard to get to that desolate place that the season of Lent sometimes conjures up when one's physical surroundings are outstandingly beautiful even during and after a major storm! We're surrounded by everything that Lent calls us *away from*: it's hard to see the need for fasting, almsgiving and prayer living where we do! It's absent the wilderness, far different from where Jesus was led by the Spirit to spend 40 days eating nothing and being tempted by the devil. We live in the middle of the temptations!

Spiritual discipline is challenging when one's surroundings do not parallel one's spiritual and cognitive aspirations. But all that glitters is not gold! There

are many for whom San Luis Obispo is not the "Happiest City in America" as was touted back in the mid-2010s by several media outlets, including Oprah! So, can our Lenten discipline of fasting, almsgiving and prayer be directed outward toward those within our community who are less likely to be able to enjoy everything this area has to offer?

During the Annual Giving Campaign, we talk about the 3 Ts: Time, Talent and Treasure, and what you can offer to the ministries of St Stephen's. Take a moment to think about those whose Time, Talent and Treasure doesn't enable them to enjoy San Luis Obispo to its fullest.

As your Lenten discipline, maybe you could reach past your comfort zone to make someone else's life less of a wilderness.

Time: Volunteer at 40 Prado when they open the warming shelter. Volunteers

are always needed there, and at SLO Food Bank.

Talent: Buy from a local artist, musician or an artisan food and drink purveyor, or give an exceptional tip to a worn out waiter who still manages to smile, or donate to a non-profit about whose work you weren't previously fully aware.

Treasure: Gift someone an experience within the beauty and bounty of SLO County who has limited treasure.

Every couple of years, the practice of Lent is *re-thunk*! *What does prayer, fasting and almsgiving look like in our time?* (Particularly fasting). There are probably many ways that you can "get into the groove" of the invitation you will receive on Ash Wednesday:

the observance of a holy Lent, by self-examination and repentance; by prayer, fasting, and self-denial; and by reading and meditating on God's holy Word.

All accomplished in our beautiful surroundings!

I leave you with this prayer by Dick Williams:

As the days lengthen and the earth spends longer in the light of day, grant that I may spend longer in the light of your presence, O Lord, and may those seeds of your Word, which have been long-buried within me, grow, like everything around us, into love for you, and love for people; to become a visible declaration of your Lordship in my life. Grant, Father, that this Lent there may be a springtime for my life in Christ.

Lent Begins

Ash Wednesday is March 5, 2025. There will be two services: 12:15 and 5:30pm. They will both be Eucharists with the Imposition of Ashes.



Notes From the Choir Loft—March 2025

In a recent staff meeting, Father Ian asked me how I could recognize Women's History Month this March 2025. I replied by saying I could feature women composers and lyricists. Fr. Ian gave me the go ahead and that is exactly what I have done for the month of March.

In researching sacred music written by women composers, I discovered fascinating websites that have been compiled for music written by women. One such site is Women Composers Database. This website is a curated database of sacred music compiling choral music and voluntaries by women composers for the church year, with listings for each Sunday and feast days. There are also sheets with listings for Mass Settings, Evening Canticles, Responses, and Anglican Chant by women composers. This site is a gold mine for church music directors!

Another great source for music written by women is the hymnal, "Voices Found". This hymnal is a unique compilation of contemporary and historical materials that crosses boundaries of geography, time, and culture as it represents the diversity of the gifts of women and seeks to affirm and expand the spirituality of all women and men as they find new voices in the church's song.

The composers I chose for this month include Hildegard von Bingen, Frances Allitsen, Sharon M. Hersey, and Eleanor Daley. Texts for these pieces include the poets Christina Rosetti, Eleanor Plunkett, Lynn Shaw Bailey and Sylvia G. Dunstan.

Women's History Month began as Women's History Week by the Education Task Force of Sonoma County. The concept quickly spread across the nation. In 1980, President Jimmy Carter issued the first Presidential Proclamation declaring the Week of March 8th, 1980 as National Women's History Week. In 1987 Congress passed Public Law 100-9 designating March as "Women's History Month".

In President Carter's message designating Women's History Week, he wrote:

"From the first settlers who came to our shores, from the first American Indian families who befriended them, men and women have worked together to build this nation. Too often the women were unsung and sometimes their contribution went unnoticed. But the achievements, leadership, courage, strength, and love of the women who built America was as vital as that of the men whose names we know so well." (womenshistory.org)

Thank you President Carter, and thank you to Fr. Ian for encouraging me to delve into this subject. I hope you enjoy the anthems this month!





Storied Pilgrimage with Race



From the Vestry

The Vestry meets on the 2nd Sunday of the Month (usually) to discuss the business affairs of the parish. Here are some highlights of the meeting on February 9, 2025:

- The Vestry discussed moving forward to form a committee for the pilot project with Smart Share Housing Solutions to put a tiny home on wheels (THOW) that is off-grid onto the slab in the parking lot. A formal decision will be made at next month's meeting.
- Gail Taylor was elected Junior Warden and Kay Lewis was approved as Treasurer. Fr Ian asked Jamie Hess to remain as Senior Warden and Brenda Enney to remain as Clerk, and they both accepted.
- The Vestry will develop a policy for Interacting with Federal & State Agencies, addressing in particular what any person should do if agents from Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) comes on campus.

The next meeting is March 9, 2025. If you have an issue that you think should be addressed by the Vestry, please submit your request no less than 2 weeks before the next Vestry Meeting to the Rector or Wardens. All Vestry Meetings are open to members of the parish. Requests to speak can be made, approved on an individual basis. Executive Sessions are closed to Vestry members only, including the Clerk, Treasurer and Rector.
