Hello & Happy Easter!

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Who Are You on That Easter Morn?

Occasionally in a sermon I'll ask you who you are in the Gospel reading, with whom do you most identify, which character is doing and saying what you would most likely say and do. We've had that conversation at Prayers & Pastries, too. While on my Silent Retreat in mid-March, I took along with me a book that I consulted on that is on that

very subject: Hero Lover Daughter Queen: Finding yourself in the Bible. The book was written specifically for the unchurched to engage them with the Bible as one would any other piece of literature. And it's that element of being drawn into the story that makes reading so engaging for many people.

On Easter Morning, the Gospel will be John 20:1-18. The account is just enough different than the other option of Luke 24:1-12. (The Resurrection stories in Matthew and Mark are shorter and have less drama, so I'm guessing that's why they aren't options for Easter Day. [As many of you know, I have a complicated relationship with the Revised Common

Lectionary!]) The great element of John's version is that there are a few more characters. There's Mary Magdalene, front and center — this is where she gets the appellation the Apostle to the Apostles. There is Peter, ever so eager to check out the tomb, and with him the disciple whom Jesus loved (whom we presume to be John, the writer). There are the 2 angels. Then then there's "the gardener", whom I will include just to give more options. And of course, there's Jesus. "The Father" is mentioned in third person, so you could probably include Him, as well.

All of these characters shape how we understand the event of The Resurrection and how the story gets contextualized for today through the preaching of a bezillion Easter Day preachers. So, I pose to you: Who are you on that Easter Morn? With whom do you most identify? Have you been different characters at different times in your life? Or are you an observer from above... is this a story that you're completely detached from?


Placing yourself in the story makes it come more alive! You pay attention to parts that you may have not given due attention in the past. It helps you discover aspects of your

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relationship with Jesus that you previously haven't considered or known!

As you journey through Holy Week (particularly Palm Sunday) and Easter (and even beyond!), find where and who you are in the stories. Reflect on how it shapes your faith, spiritual practice and relationship with Jesus. Our faith is a living faith, not an exercise in nostalgia. We are to learn from these ancient scriptures, make sense of them for our day. These big celebrations are the perfect opportunities for you to dive right in and then emerge on the exciting new step on your spiritual journey!

From the Vestry

The Vestry meets on the 2nd Sunday of the Month (usually) to discuss the business affairs of the parish. Here are some highlights of the meeting on March 9, 2025:

- * The Vestry will use some Re-Fresh St Stephen's funds to add a function to the sound system to enable the audio to go directly into people's hearing aids, and to add a new mic jack in the parish hall for the occasions we worship in Ramsden Hall.
- * The Vestry reviewed a procedure for interacting with State and Federal agents, in particular, immigration agents. (see article on the subject)
- * The Vestry approved the Job Description and Letter of Agreement to offer Spud Schroeder the position of Sexton.

The next meeting is scheduled for April 13, 2025, unless the business of that meeting is accomplished at the Vestry Retreat on March 29. If you have an issue that you think should be addressed by the Vestry, please submit your request no less than 2 weeks before the next Vestry Meeting to the Rector or Wardens. All Vestry Meetings are open to members of the parish. Requests to speak can be made, approved on an individual basis. Executive Sessions are closed to Vestry members only, including the Clerk, Treasurer and Rector.

Loving and Protecting Our Neighbors

To my knowledge, we've never had an agent from any State or Federal agency come onto St Stephen's property for any official reason. We have had SLO Police Officers onsite, both by invitation and casually. But the possibility exists that agents may come onsite – identifiable or not – and start to ask questions. In particular, US Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE).

ICE has the mission to protect the USA from cross-border crime and illegal immigration. Under the new administration, ICE has orders to deport many more people. Our neighbors who came here to escape violence and find work now live in fear that their families will be separated by deportations. These include those who arrived here with proper documentation and those who have not. Even some US Citizens are now living in fear. They need our help. They have legal rights.

The way that we at St Stephen's can help is to be equipped with knowledge, particularly around the rights which are afforded to every person residing in the United States regardless of citizenship or immigration status.

Firstly, out of respect for any person, we do not ever need to discuss the immigration status of any person, present or absent, parishioner or friend, neighbor or passerby. It's not pertinent to the life of St Stephen's – no contribution to our Welcoming – Worshiping – Working. Also, there may be agents overhearing conversations. So, since there is no reason to discuss anyone's immigration status, let's simply not do that at St Stephen's.

Secondly, every person has the right to NOT answer questions. If a person approaches you and begins asking questions about particular persons or where a group of people might be, you have the right to refuse to answer.



Direct them to the Rector or the Wardens during office hours, which are Monday through Thursday, 9am to 1pm. Unless the agent has a warrant for <u>your</u> detention, you do NOT have to answer questions. To any awkward question, respond: "I do not wish to answer any questions. Am I free to leave?"

Thirdly, all indoor spaces at St Stephen's are considered private, except the entryway of the church (Narthex). If the agent produces a warrant to enter the private spaces, it *must* be a *Judicial* warrant signed by a *judge*. Judicial warrants have the name of the *Federal* Court that it was issued from at the top of the page: United States District Court. Warrants from ICE do not grant permission to enter private spaces. In either case, refer them to the Rector and Wardens during office hours, which are Monday through Thursday, 9am to 1pm.

Spring Renewal

Spring Renewal is a time for everyone in our diocese to gather for fellowship, formation, and fun.

On Saturday May 17th, they will share presentations about their ministry together in Navajoland, the challenges and joys of the work they share, and the unique experience of meeting Navajo spirituality and the spiritual tradition of The Episcopal Church, which they both embody in their respective roles. Our presenters are candid, thoughtful, and deeply committed to the calling they will share with us.

Additionally, our Truth Telling Taskforce will give a brief presentation introducing an educational tool that is the product of many hours of thoughtful work. This is a website that highlights indigenous peoples in our area and in the state of California. This is a fine piece of work that will be available to share in our congregations and our schools.

The two-day event will be interspersed with liturgies and the musical genius of Juneau Rowe of the Church of the Good Shepherd, Corral de Tierra. As always, our Spring Renewal will close with a joyful Eucharist.
